LSAT TESTING

Due to continued COVID-19 health concerns, the LSAT has shifted to an online, remotely proctored version of the test. In an effort to enhance student success, the MSU Testing Center reserved a quiet room for examination completion in our center on *October 7th*. We have limited capacity and can only serve students at the following times: 7:30-10am, 10:30am-1pm, 1:30-4pm, 4:30-6pm.

Students must provide their own testing equipment. Testing Center staff will not provide technical support for this examination. Late arrivals will not receive additional time to complete their examination.

The Testing Center is exploring different options for the additional testing dates in October (3, 4, 6, and 8) so please inform us if there are students requesting assistance in securing a space on those days as well. Testing on days outside of our normal business hours of 8-4 on M-F may incur a \$20 fee for MSU students (non-MSU students will pay \$30 regardless of day).

MSU DIALOGUES

MSU Dialogues Fall 2020 registration is officially open. MSU Dialogues is an 8-week intergroup dialogue experience for MSU students, faculty, and staff offered through the Office for Inclusion and Intercultural Initiatives. The program is offered as part of MSU's greater efforts to support students, faculty, and staff in creating more inclusive and equitable learning environments. Based on your availability, you will be placed in a group who you will meet with each week for 1.5 hours. Throughout the semester, you will engage in dialogue with people from a wide range of identities and backgrounds, learn about historical and present day social injustice, and collectively explore ways of working toward greater equity and inclusion.

Student AND faculty/staff dialogues will meet ONLINE via Zoom for 8 weeks, 90 minutes each week. Dialogues are offered at a variety of times throughout the week, so there is likely a time that fits in your schedule!

Undergraduate and graduate students have the option to choose between participating in a dialogue focused on race or religion. We will also offer one race dialogue for graduate students and one race dialogue for first year students. The dialogue focused on religion is made possible through partnership with the Muslim Studies Program and The Michael and Elaine Serling Institute for Jewish Studies and Modern Israel.

CROSS-CULTURAL CONVERSATIONS

The African Studies Center is pleased to invite applications from MSU undergraduate and graduate students for participation in a series of virtual conversations with students at Stellenbosch University (South Africa). The conversations offer a forum for sharing experiences and for fostering cross-cultural understanding on contemporary and critical issues confronting young people across the Atlantic. These include, but are not limited to the history, legacies, and persistence of; and responses to systemic racism. The virtual conversations are part of the Ubuntu Dialogues project, an Andrew W. Mellon Foundation-funded partnership between the MSU African Studies Center and the Stellenbosch University Museum. The partnership project seeks to establish new and strengthen existing connections and cooperation between universities, museums, and communities through transnational dialogue and engagement among students, faculty and community partners in South Africa and the U.S. The project includes three main components: virtual student conversations; a seminar speaker exchange program; and a student internship program.

The virtual conversations are designed to bring together South African and American students from historically marginalized and underrepresented minority backgrounds, respectively. They provide participants the opportunity to connect and rethink national,

racial, linguistic, and other boundaries and differences; and to promote the resolution of real and imagined differences through dialogue. There is the potential for those who participate in the virtual student conversations to be considered for the student internship portion of the Ubuntu Dialogues project, which provides a funded study abroad opportunity to Cape Town, South Africa.

The fall 2020 conversations consist of four consecutive sessions scheduled for 9:00 – 10:30 am on the following *Thursdays: 10/08, 10/15, 10/22, and 10/29.* Only those from underrepresented minority backgrounds who commit to participating in all four sessions will be considered. Interested and eligible candidates are invited to submit a one-page resume and a Statement of Interest (150-200 words) spelling out the reasons for applying, including any connections to or prior knowledge of South Africa. The resume and Statement of Interest should be sent as one PDF file over email to Dr. Upenyu Majee (Project Manager, Ubuntu Dialogues), at majeeupe@msu.edu by *Friday 09/11.* Also, feel free to reach out to Dr. Majee with any questions.

Do you find yourself taking notes and then not knowing how to study them later? Or maybe the way you take notes just isn't working for every class. This workshop will introduce you to different strategies to revitalize your note-taking and and increase the variety of note-taking and note-using methods you can use for different purposes including note-taking during lectures, reviewing new material, deep study, and other circumstances.

Annotate Your Way to Higher Grades Wed 9/30 5:00-6:00pm

Research shows that students who learn how to annotate texts and lectures tend to significantly increase their grades while spending less time studying. This workshop teaches easy, time-saving, annotation skills to replace less efficient methods when you really need to understand large quantities of new information. Underlining, highlighting, outlining, or copying of text content you may be doing now can all be good strategies, but may not be the most efficient learning strategy for more challenging reading tasks. This workshop will help you become a more engaged, strategic, and efficient reader.
