Master of Science in Global Health (MS)

Program Overview

The Master of Science in Global Health (MS) is asynchronously 100% online and can be completed in as little as one year. The program is designed to empower graduates with the tools and skills needed to address global health challenges. Students complete 30 credits on either a full-time or part-time basis.

Applicants

A medical background is not required. The MS degree is designed for students from a variety of backgrounds, not just those in the medical field. No GRE required and the application fee may be waived in some situations.

Voting Information:

Providing space to vote is vital to the democratic process, and MSU is committed to making voting convenient for our campus community. Our university is home to five on-campus Election Day voting precincts, and we've partnered with the East Lansing City Clerk's Office to offer one-stop-shop satellite offices on campus leading up to Election Day. Those who are eligible can register to vote and request and drop off absentee ballots at any of the satellite offices, as well as at the City Clerk's main office (410 Abbot Road). There is also a convenient drop box located at the CATA hub on campus. The East Lansing City Clerk's Office, as well as the satellite office at Brody, will offer sameday voter registration on Election Day and serve as resources for any questions voters may have about the voting process.

Locations and hours for the satellite office are:

- Oct. 26-28 | MSU IM Sports East, 804 E. Shaw Lane Open 11 a.m.-7 p.m. each day
- Oct. 31-Nov. 8 | MSU Brody Hall, 241 W. Brody Road Open 11 a.m.-7 p.m. from Oct. 31 to Nov. 6 Open 11 a.m.-4 p.m. on Monday, Nov. 7 Open 7 a.m.-8 p.m. on Tuesday, Nov. 8 (Election Day)

Please share this information with all students and colleagues. Voting resources can be found on MSUvote's Website. There is also a helpful list of important dates below.

It's critical that we lead by example by voting in our respective communities, so prepare yourself for Election Day and help make a difference in your community and beyond.

Important dates to consider:

- Oct. 25 to Nov. 8 by 8 p.m.: In-person voter registration with local clerk with proof of residency
- Nov. 4 by 5 p.m.: Deadline that voters may request an absentee ballot be mailed to them
- Nov. 4 by 5 p.m.: Deadline that voters may submit a written request to spoil their absentee ballot and receive a new ballot by mail
- Nov. 4 by 5 p.m.: Deadline that voters who have returned their absentee ballot may submit a
 written request in person to spoil their absentee ballot and receive a new one in the clerk's
 office
- Nov. 4 by 5 p.m.: Deadline that voters who have lost their absentee ballot or not yet received
 their ballot in the mail may submit a written request in person to spoil their absentee ballot
 and receive a new ballot in the clerk's office
- Nov. 7 by 4 p.m.: Deadline that voters may obtain an absentee ballot in person in the clerk's office, unless they are registering to vote on Election Day

Nov. 8: Election Day, polls are open from 7 a.m.-8 p.m.

Description:

Operated by Allen Neighborhood Center (ANC) and located within the city of Lansing's Hunter Park, the GardenHouse and Edible Park serve as a demonstration site for year-round urban garden and farm education, and as a hub where neighbors volunteer to grow food, flowers, and community. The GardenHouse is a sustainably farmed greenhouse that grows produce for ANC's Veggie Box Community Supported Agriculture program as well as its Breadbasket Food Pantry. Edible Park is a free-to-all, you-pick community garden and orchard serving Lansing's Eastside with seasonal fresh food. Volunteering will start at the Allen Neighborhood Center and transition to the GardenHouse.

Volunteers at Hunter Park can expect a wide range of activities depending on current growing cycles and seasonal needs. This may include:

- Compost and mulch spreading
- Weeding
- Watering
- Harvesting
- Tool cleaning
- Planting
